

## 9. COMMUNITY

## —True Fellowship

After Jesus ascended to heaven (Acts 1:9-11) about 120 of his followers gathered together for prayer. Their first task was to select a 12<sup>th</sup> apostle, Matthias, to replace Judas Iscariot. Shortly thereafter, on the day of Pentecost, the Holy Spirit descended upon them with tongues of fire and they began to speak in other languages, the languages of the many ethnicities present in the crowd of people attracted to the miraculous presence of God. The apostle Peter brought clarity to the phenomenon by Biblically explaining the news of salvation. He said, “Repent, and each one of you be baptized in the name of Jesus Christ for the forgiveness of your sins; and you will receive the gift of the Holy Spirit. For the promise is for you and for your children, and for all who are far off, as many as the Lord will call to Himself.” (Acts 2:38-39 NASB). About 3000 people responded to Peter’s message. The Church was born.

Everyone began “continually devoting themselves to the apostle’s teaching, and to *fellowship*, to the breaking of bread and to prayer.” (Acts 2:42). So what is Biblical fellowship? Our English term *fellowship* comes from the Greek word *koinonia* which connotes an intimate community, or communion, of saints who share a common belief that God the Father, through Jesus Christ the Son, by and in the Holy Spirit welcomes humankind into His family by grace. This relationship is available to those who acknowledge the life, death and resurrection of Jesus, and who confess His lordship in their lives. The household of faith, is related not only to the living God, but also to one another, as members of a spiritual family.
